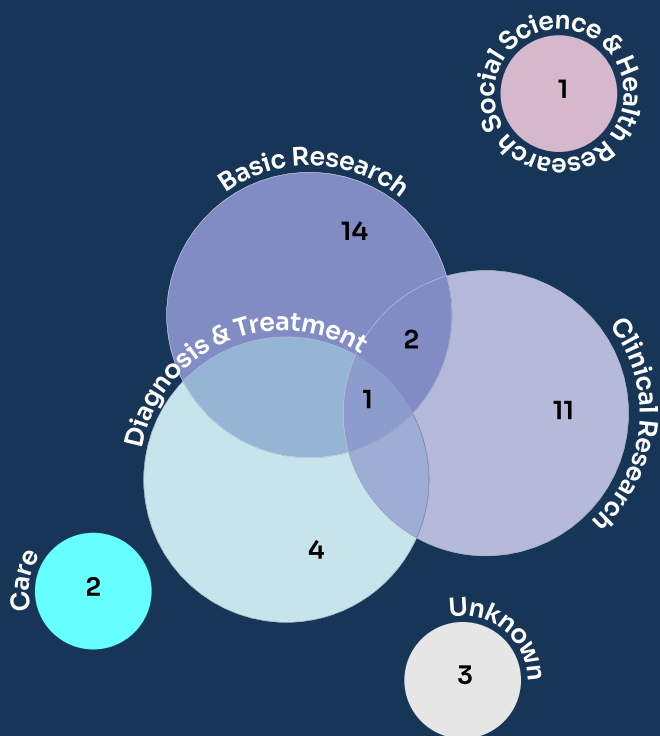

Members

More members, more engagement, more community: 2025 was a year of growth.

In 2025, the association welcomed 32 new members. The largest increases were recorded in the student and senior categories, with 11 new members added to each group, and 10 new associate members joining. This growth reflects a stable and diverse membership base and underscores the ongoing relevance of the association across different communities in Switzerland.

Membership spans a range of age groups and professional backgrounds, providing a broad spectrum of expertise and perspectives. While members show varying levels of engagement, many actively contribute to the association's work. Some were involved in organizing events, participated in the association's own Swiss Dementia Forum or contributed through presentations or by serving on the organizing committee, demonstrating the potential for continued and expanded participation.

Looking ahead, the association aims to build on this foundation, encouraging more members to share ideas, provide feedback and take initiative, thereby strengthening collaboration and the overall impact of the community.

General Assembly 2025

Report on the first General Assembly.



The first edition, held at the Inselspital Bern on 15 May, brought together members, the board and the management office to discuss key matters, including the approval of the annual and financial reports, as well as prospective activities for the association in the coming year.

The General Assembly was opened by Prof. Andreas Lüthi, President of the Swiss Network for Dementia Research, who welcomed the participants and outlined the network's mission, its vision, and the background to its establishment. He also presented the organizational structure and introduced the Management Office. The Management Office subsequently provided an overview of its services and highlighted key milestones achieved since the network's foundation in 2023.

An engaging and constructive exchange took place between members regarding the network's current and future activities. The valuable suggestions and ideas shared during the discussion will be carefully considered in the development of new initiatives and services.

The annual financial statements for 2024 were presented to the members and reviewed in detail. The members unanimously approved the annual accounts.

Partnerships of the network 2025

Strong partnerships expanded impact and created new opportunities for collaboration.

Collaboration lies at the heart of the network's mission to advance dementia research and care in Switzerland. Through partnerships with leading organizations, the network enhances efforts to deepen understanding of dementia and to translate research findings into practical solutions.

Swiss Memory Clinics

In 2025, the network partnered with the Swiss Memory Clinics, a nationwide network of clinical centers supporting the diagnosis, treatment, and care of people with dementia across Switzerland. The partnership seeks to bridge the gap between research and clinical practice, enhance mutual understanding between the two fields and improve the translation of research into practical care, while clinical insights support patient-centered research. Early outcomes of this collaboration include the establishment of a clinical site on the community platform and the launch of the "Dementia Update – Clinical Series" webinar series in 2026.

Age-INT

The network joined forces with AGE-INT, a consortium dedicated to addressing the challenges of an ageing society. As part of the AGE-INTer-

national consortium, the Dementia Cluster is focused on developing and evaluating innovative approaches to improve care for people with dementia. AGE-INT is an important partner, bringing expertise in patient-centered care to the network. Together, the collaboration aims to ensure that the needs of patients are better understood and integrated into research, improving the quality of life for people with dementia and their families.

Women's Brain Foundation

A third key partnership was established with the Women's Brain Foundation (WBF), a Swiss-based international organization advancing precision medicine in brain and mental health and addressing the gender gap in research and treatment. Through this collaboration, the network and WBF promote awareness of sex- and gender-based research, aiming to close the gender gap in dementia research and care. This partnership ensures that research and clinical strategies are inclusive and responsive to the specific needs of all patients.

The association's 2025 activities

Community Platform

The new community platform creates a central hub for dementia research and care in Switzerland. Since its 2025 launch, it has attracted strong engagement, with over 39,000 visits and 56 expert profiles showcasing research, resources and collaboration opportunities. By connecting researchers, clinicians, caregivers and early career professionals, the platform fosters transparency, knowledge exchange and networking, while ongoing developments — including clinical resources and patient involvement tools — strengthen the link between research and practice.

Swiss Dementia Forum 2025

The first Swiss Dementia Forum, held in Bern in November 2025, brought together over 250 participants from research, clinical practice and caregiving under the theme 'Building bridges between research, treatment and care.' Featuring 35 speakers, including a keynote on amyloid-targeting therapies, the Forum fostered interdisciplinary dialogue, high-quality knowledge exchange, and networking. With engaging sessions across basic science, clinical practice, AI, public health and patient perspectives, the event marked a milestone for collaboration in Swiss dementia research and care.

Dementia Update - Virtual Series

The Dementia Update – Virtual Series connect research and clinical practice: Since January 2025, 189 participants from 16 countries have gained practical insights on dementia, formed new professional connections, and strengthened interdisciplinary collaboration.



Swiss Dementia Forum 2025

High-level talks and strong participation defined the first Swiss Dementia Forum.

The Swiss Network for Dementia Research's first-ever, in-person Swiss Dementia Forum took place on 6 – 7 November 2025 in Bern. Under the guidance of Chair Prof. Bogdan Draganski and the Scientific Committee, the Forum was created to provide a platform for interdisciplinary dialogue and networking, bringing together professionals from diverse fields involved in dementia research and care. The program was designed to engage participants across the spectrum, from basic scientists to clinicians and caregivers.

Over 1.5 days, more than 250 participants with varied expertise and institutional backgrounds attended. One third of participants were engaged in basic research, while clinical researchers and healthcare professionals formed the next largest group. Among the attendees, 21 were members (8%) of the Association.

A highlight of the Forum was the active and lively exchange of knowledge between participants from different disciplines. The program featured 35 speakers presenting high-quality talks from multiple perspectives. A special keynote was delivered by Dr. Gil Rabinovici (University of California San Francisco), who shared his experience implementing amyloid-targeting therapies in the U.S, providing valuable insights for Switzerland. The Swiss Memory Clinics were also represented with a session on blood-based biomarkers.

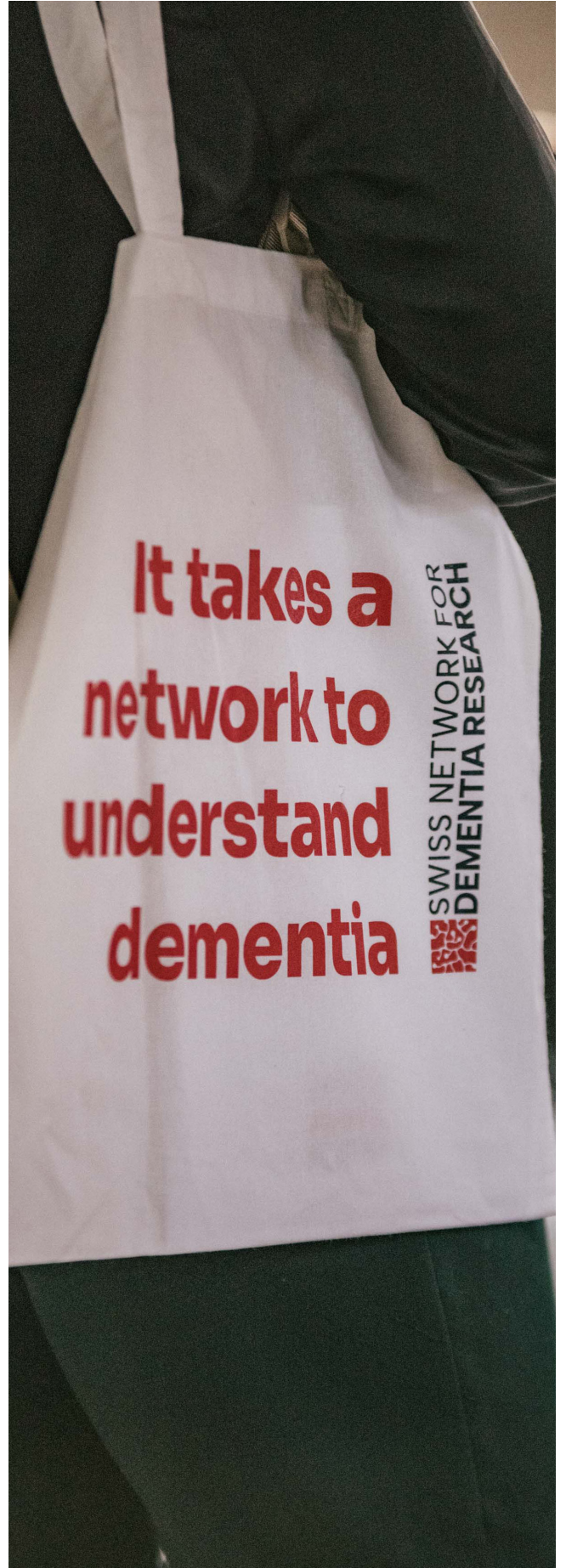
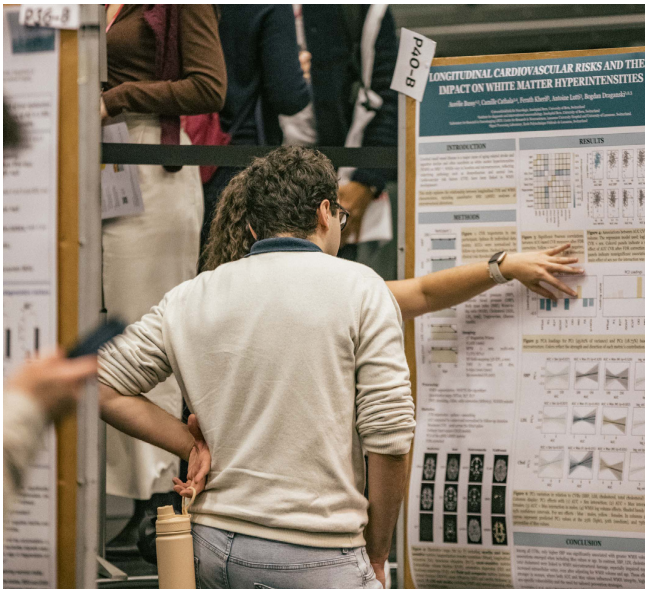
Other topics included public health perspectives, dementia care, AI and data analytics, memory traces, as well as practical workshops on implementation and translational science, interdisciplinary collaboration and patient perspectives. The program thus covered a broad range of topics across dementia research, treatment and care.

The event was made possible thanks to the support of 14 generous sponsors, including nine on-site exhibitors, one sponsor for the best Lightning Talk Award and two for Poster Awards. We would like to thank all the sponsors, participants and everyone who made the Forum an engaging and memorable experience. The next edition is planned for 11-12 November 2027.

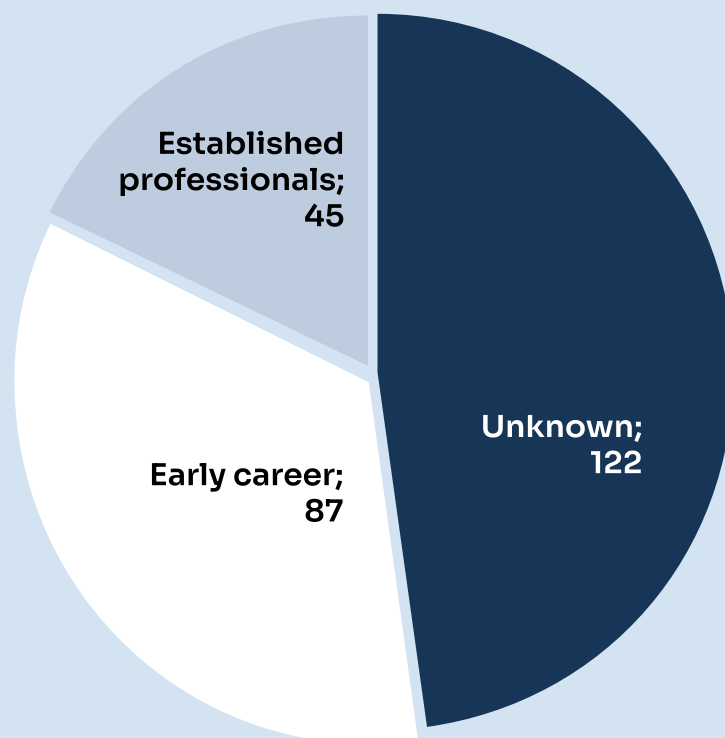

Knowledge hub for dementia research

The community platform fostering exchange and raising the profile of dementia research in Switzerland.

With the community platform, we established a centralized hub for dementia research and care in Switzerland. The platform aims to enhance transparency by providing a comprehensive overview of ongoing research projects and their findings, current initiatives, available jobs and funding opportunities, as well as upcoming events. Researchers from different disciplines, clinicians, caregivers, and early career researchers affiliated in Switzerland can create expert profiles to showcase their research interests, available resources, ongoing efforts and collaboration opportunities, fostering knowledge exchange across the community.

Following a pre-launch at the Synapsis Forum on 18 November 2024 in Gerzensee, the platform officially went live at the beginning of 2025. It was actively promoted through our communication channels and received strong engagement from the community. Within its first year, the platform recorded over 39,000 visits and featured 56 expert profiles, reflecting its value as a central point for information, visibility and collaboration. In addition to the program page of the Swiss Dementia Forum and the registration form, the expert profiles were the most frequently accessed content, with a total of 1'625 views, highlighting the strong interest in visibility and networking opportunities.

Throughout 2025, the platform was further developed and expanded. In collaboration with the Swiss Memory Clinics, a dedicated clinical site was launched, offering resources such as publications, updates, guidelines, diagnostic tools, events and ongoing projects seeking study participants. This section aims to support clinical professionals and strengthen the link between research and practice. In addition, a dedicated section on Patient and Public Involvement and Engagement (PPIE) was created. This site outlines what PPIE is, how patients and the public can become involved and provides access to toolkits, articles, and curated links to support effective involvement in dementia research.

Overall, the launch and continuous development of the community platform marked an important milestone in strengthening collaboration and knowledge exchange in dementia research and care in Switzerland. By bringing together researchers from different disciplines, healthcare professionals, relevant partners and industry, it contributes to greater transparency, visibility and connectivity across the field. The platform will continue to be expanded and refined to meet the evolving needs of the community.

The research site serves as Switzerland's central hub for dementia research, offering valuable insights into the latest advancements and facilitating connections with experts. It features comprehensive expert profiles, highlights ongoing projects, and provides access to recent publications, funding opportunities, and initiatives.

This site enhances transparency by helping users understand who is engaged in which research efforts and what kind of projects have already been accomplished. It is particularly beneficial for young researchers looking to establish their networks and stay informed about developments in the field. Additionally, the site offers support in locating available resources such as biosamples, animal models or diagnostic tools and assisting users in exploring funding possibilities.

Expert Profile

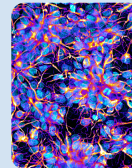

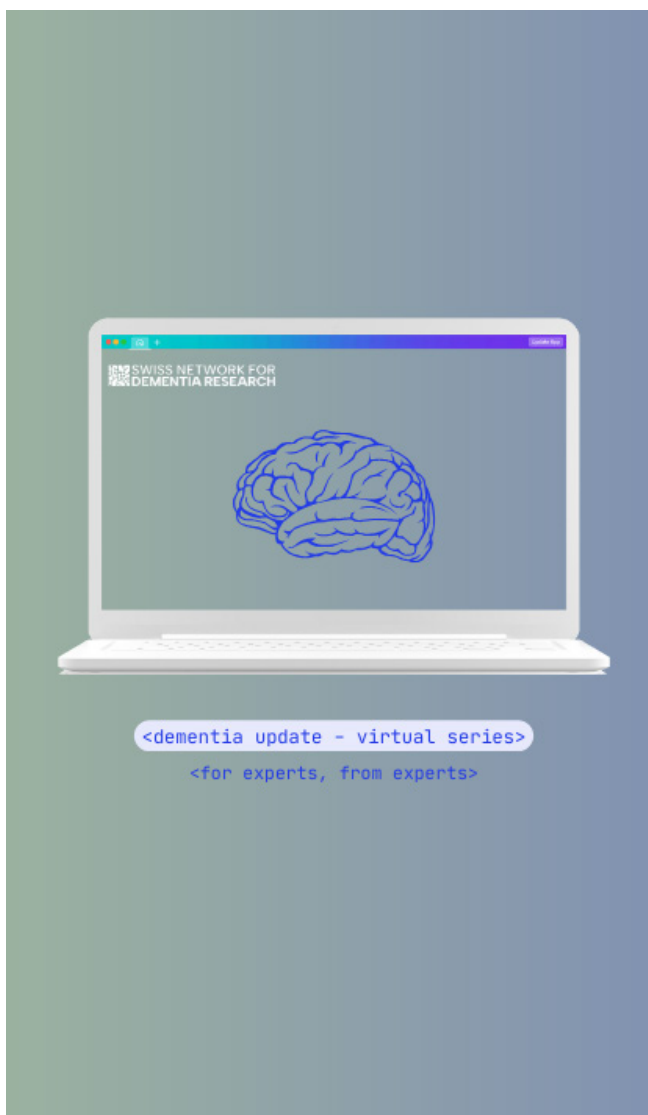

Dementia Update – Virtual Series

Across multiple sessions, the virtual series fostered dialogue and knowledge exchange.



In January 2025, the Dementia Update – Virtual Series was launched with the strategic goal of fostering collaboration and networking among participants from research and clinical practice. Over the past year, the monthly series has reached 189 participants across 16 countries, delivering high-quality, interdisciplinary content on dementia research and clinical care.

Participants rated the relevance and practical value of the webinar content at an average of 3.57 out of 5, reflecting the series' impact on knowledge transfer and professional development. Survey responses indicate that 29% of participants have formed new professional connections through the webinars, underscoring the value of our networking objectives. Additional insights highlight opportunities to further enhance interdisciplinary exchange across dementia research domains.

Over the year, the series has covered topics about cellular and molecular mechanisms of dementia, innovative therapeutic approaches, new technologies in diagnostics and interventions to enhance cognitive functions.

Communicating for impact

Targeted communication activities increased visibility and strengthened the outreach.

The communication activities in 2025 primarily supported the positioning of the Swiss Network for Dementia Research as a central point of reference for questions related to dementia research in Switzerland. At the same time, they contributed to the targeted growth of the community, lead generation and an increase in the network's national visibility.

Social media – particularly LinkedIn – functioned as a strategic performance driver within the overall communication mix, significantly contributing to visibility, community growth, and lead generation. Through carefully curated, audience-relevant content, users were systematically guided along the communication funnel — from awareness to deeper engagement and ultimately to conversion via targeted redirects to in-depth website content and registration forms.

A particularly effective recurring format was the monthly “Reading Recommendations” series, which generated consistently high interaction rates and substantially increased engagement through shares, likes and comments. Webinar promotions further strengthened the conversion pathway by attracting new audiences and successfully directing them to the website, where they registered for events and subscribed to further updates.

In addition, the intensive and sustained communication surrounding the Swiss Dementia Forum - supported by regular posts before, during, and after the event - led to a significant increase in both follower growth and engagement rates on LinkedIn. This growth extended beyond the platform itself: during peak communication phases, particularly in connection with registration deadlines, website traffic increased noticeably and showed a clear correlation with related LinkedIn postings.

The event generated strong organic amplification, with the network being frequently mentioned and tagged in posts by participants and partner organizations. This secondary reach further expanded visibility, strengthened positioning within the Swiss dementia research landscape, and contributed to measurable profile growth beyond the existing community.

The newsletter "Dementia Research Update" was distributed on a monthly basis to a broad mailing list comprising both national and international contact. In terms of content, however, the focus was clearly placed on the Swiss community. Topics included open positions in Switzerland, current events, national research initiatives, fundraising opportunities and relevant news from the Swiss research landscape. The newsletter therefore served as a key instrument for continuous information, engagement and activation of the audience.

In addition, targeted special newsletters were sent to segmented recipient groups throughout the year to support event communication related to the Swiss Dementia Forum.

In the coming year, the establishment of a closed LinkedIn group is planned. This group will function as a moderated forum and enable a protected exchange among Swiss stakeholders in dementia research and care. In addition, the members-only newsletter, which was launched for the first time in December 2025, will be further developed and expanded in 2026 to strengthen exclusive communication, knowledge sharing and engagement within the network.

Bericht der Revisionsstelle zur eingeschränkten Revision
An die Mitgliederversammlung des

Vereins Swiss Network for Dementia Research, Basel

Als Revisionsstelle haben wir die Jahresrechnung (bestehend aus Bilanz, Betriebsrechnung und Anhang) des Vereins Swiss Network for Dementia Research für das am 31. Dezember 2025 abgeschlossene Geschäftsjahr geprüft.

Für die Jahresrechnung ist der Vorstand verantwortlich, während unsere Aufgabe darin besteht, die Jahresrechnung zu prüfen. Wir bestätigen, dass wir die gesetzlichen Anforderungen hinsichtlich Zulassung und Unabhängigkeit erfüllen.

Unsere Revision erfolgte nach dem Schweizer Standard zur Eingeschränkten Revision. Demnach ist diese Revision so zu planen und durchzuführen, dass wesentliche Fehlaussagen in der Jahresrechnung erkannt werden. Eine eingeschränkte Revision umfasst hauptsächlich Befragungen und analytische Prüfungshandlungen sowie den Umständen angemessene Detailprüfungen der bei der geprüften Einheit vorhandenen Unterlagen.
